Key findings from a statewide survey of 500 registered voters in Ohio conducted September 9-14, 2014.



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### METHODOLOGY

- Statewide survey of 500 registered voters in Ohio conducted on both landlines and cell phones
- O Interviewing completed September 9-14, 2014
- $\bigcirc$  Overall margin of error of <u>+</u> 4.38%
- Sample distributed proportionally throughout the state and is demographically representative of the electorate
- O Bipartisan research team of Hart Research and Public Opinion Strategies

By a twelve point margin, Ohio residents favor funding needs such as education over fiscal restraint.

# Voters rate giving children a strong start in life as more important than any other issue, except the economy and jobs.





### A solid majority of Ohio voters say we should be doing more to prepare children for kindergarten.




### Three-quarters of Democrats and pluralities of independents and Republicans say we should do more.

Start Kindergarten in Ohio with Skills/Knowledge To Succeed By Party




# Majorities in every region say we should do more for early childhood education measure.

### Ohioans are only slightly lower than voters nationally.





### EARLY EDUCATION PROPOSAL

"Now, thinking about one potential national proposal -- Congress is considering a plan that would help states and local communities provide better early childhood education programs to parents of children from birth to five. It provides ten billion dollars per year for ten years in grants to states to provide all low and moderate income four year olds with voluntary access to high-quality preschool programs. It also makes available voluntary programs in high-quality early education and child care for infants and toddlers, as well as home visiting and parent education."

### Nearly two-thirds of Ohio voters support this proposal.




Would you support or oppose this plan to help states and local communities provide better early childhood education?


### Again, Ohio voters are somewhat lower than voters nationally.

There is a clear partisan distinction, with three-in-five Independent voters supporting this proposal.




### A majority of younger GOP support the proposal, while older Republicans are divided pretty much down the middle.


Early Education Proposal By Republicans/Age

Republicans Ages 18-49 (15%)




Republicans Ages 50+ (20%)

#### **Early Education Proposal By Age**



# Key sub-groups of swing voters overwhelmingly support this proposal.


**Early Education Ballot By Key Groups**



# Seven-in-ten voters support using a portion of the state budget surplus to provide more early childhood education.




Ohio has had significant budget surpluses for two years in a row and experts anticipate we will have another surplus this year. Would you support or oppose using a portion of the state budget surplus to help local communities provide more children with quality early childhood education programs?

Two-thirds or more in every region of the state support using a portion of the budget surplus for early childhood education.

#### Surplus Proposal By Region







### Support is also significant across demographic sub-groups.

# And two-thirds voice support for offering every new parent voluntary coaching and education.



Prior to 2009, every new parent in Ohio was offered free, voluntary coaching and education from a registered nurse to help them improve their child's health and help ensure children are ready to learn when they start school. Would you support or oppose starting this program again?

# Both of these proposals generate majority support across the partisan spectrum.

#### **Education Proposals By Party (% Support)**

# These proposals are also supported by both parents and those without children at home.

#### **Education Proposals By Parent Status (% Support)**

Three-quarters say that investments in early childhood education programs would help Ohio's economy.

### THE BOTTOM LINE

- O hio voters say preparing children for school and life is a top priority for the state and nation, second only to the economy.
- State voters want action at both the national and state level to do more to ensure our children are prepared for kindergarten. A majority want Congress to act now on the Strong Start for Children proposal.
- O An overwhelming majority want the state to use a portion of the budget surplus to expand pre-school programs in the state. Majorities across the political spectrum, in every region, and of key sub-groups back this proposal. They also back voluntary "coaching" for all new parents.
- O Three-quarters say early education investments would help Ohio's economy.
